Looking Back and Looking Forward

CIBike has had a very active 2019.

CIBike grants in 2019 to governmental and non-profit organizations were substantial and are already reaping tangible benefits. At our recent Holiday Party, Bill Faulkner, CIBike Grants Director, reviewed the over \$45,000 in grants that the board approved this year. The majority of the funds support youth cycling in Ventura County.

As a result of a CIBike grant there is now a highly engaging bike safety and skills training for all 6th graders in the Ventura Unified School District. Our grant, which purchased the bicycles for the training, is the foundation that allows an ongoing partnership between the school district, the City of Ventura, BikeVentura, and CIBike to teach young people to ride. We hope that, once exposed to bicycling, they make it part of their lives as they grow into adulthood.

CIBike supported other youth bicycling programs with grants to BikeVentura (bike rodeos), Simi Valley Boy Scouts (12 Points Bike Ride), Newbury Park Middle/High School Mountain Bike Team (Trailer for support of team travel), and VeloSport Cycling (travel support for junior racers).

Additionally, CIBike continued our financial support of the very important national, state, and regional bicycle advocacy organizations that are working effectively to network and create better conditions for cyclists. We provided funding to the League of American Bicyclists, Adventure Cycling, Rails to Trails, California Bicycle Coalition, and CycleCalCoast.

A big Thank You to all of you who have volunteered for the Cool Breeze or participated in our bike advocacy activities! You are making good things happen.



CIBike Influence goes Beyond Stellar Cycling Abilities – Our Bike Advocacy Extends through Counties and Benefits Us all.

It's been a while since we've updated you about Government Liaison issues. A lot is going on!

Oct 30 and 31 People for Bikes conducted two conferences. One at BikeVentura focused on Ventura issues. Another in Santa Barbara addressed biking infrastructure issues with a broader brush. We were pleased that Ventura City Councilmember Christy Weir attended both.

You may remember that People for Bikes spoke to our club about local cycling safety, connectivity and accessibility. It turns out that Ventura is not very different from Santa Barbara, Lompoc, Santa Maria and other nearby communities as regards these issues. It is also the case that communities can make dramatic improvements to ridership and safety. "All" they need is expanded connectivity and a comprehensive, measurable plan. People for Bikes shared with us examples and game plans of communities that have. If you are interested in being part of such an effort, please contact Kate or me.

In Saticoy a comparable effort is underway. Alta Planning and Design is seeking a grant to improve access and connectivity for cyclists and pedestrians in this little community. Dec 8 they will hold a "Walk Audit," an assessment of challenges and fixes. Kate and I have been attending these meetings and will do the walk as well.

And finally, **TA-DAH!** improvements many of you have helped bring about in Ventura County by attending Ventura County Board of Supervisors meetings.

The board has done short-to-mid range planning and budgeting to add bike lanes to county roads starting with the low-hanging fruit. For example, the county just added **29 miles of new Class 2 bike lanes** by restriping and signing existing paved shoulders!

The board is also willing to tackle more costly projects. CIBike member Steve Bennett secured a vote to spend an unprecedented **\$6 million+ of county funds over the next few years to add new bike lanes to county roads.** This is the first time that general-purpose county funds have been used for bike lanes. Locally, we expect the Casitas Vista Road and Rice Road bike lanes to be built next year.

There well may be more to come. The draft circulation version of Ventura County General Plan Update addresses cycling connectivity and inclusion in very positive ways. I encourage you to look at **Section 4.2** of this proposed plan. https://vc2040.org/images/2040_General_Plan_Files_-

The bike improvements in this ambitious plan are not at all secure. This spring and early summer there will be opportunities to weigh in. We will surely let you know! Meanwhile, feel free to request updates at https://vc2040.org/


Challenge Accepted!

On December 15, 2018, an intrepid group of CIBikers accepted the challenge of biking up Gibraltar Mountain in Santa Barbara County. According to a Roots Rated blog, this challenging bike climb is the most scenic cycling climb in Southern California and is consistently placed on the list of Top 50 world class cycling climbs. It is 3,995 feet from sea level to La Cumbre Peak. But did that intimidate our CIBikers? Heck No! Challenge accepted!

Better Bike Lanes Wanted Along Olivas Park Drive

For 25 years City of Ventura has planned to extend Olivas Park Drive

and connect to Johnson Road at the Hwy 101 southbound ramp (see purple line on map). Not a bad idea, except two accessories of the project are: (1) build a levee between the road and the Santa Clara River (brown line on map); and (2) for the purpose of paving acres of the adjacent land for industrial use (pink and yellow areas on map). Structural flood protection techniques like this are outdated. Levees have zero climate change resiliency, no question are going to overtop, and kill the river environment.


What a wasted opportunity!

Many residents want a more environmentally acceptable vision for the area. They want the Santa Clara River to be valued and for its north bank to be open as a recreation corridor. They want a modern approach used incorporating non-structural flood protection, water quality improvement, and ecosystem elements. Yet, nothing can stop the levee according to city planning, "It is a done deal previously analyzed in an EIR and approved by council years ago."

Local leaders want a higher quality project at the site.

It is visible by hundreds of thousands of drivers along Hwy 101. At least three things would make the plan better: (1) change the planned on-street, painted bike lanes into a 2-way SAFE protected bike lane along the river side of Olivas Park Dr., (2) provide access from the protected bike lane onto the levee for river views, birdwatching and education, and (3) add connectivity from the requested protected bike lane to the Johnson Rd bike transportation (see street cross section). Imagine! Connectivity for people bike riding from where they live almost to the beach! This is still a work in progress, so please find out more and help.
