A Most Scenic Coast-to-Coast Michigan Tour

Looking for a coast to coast tour somewhat short of the Pacific to the Atlantic, there is always Lake Michigan to Lake Huron at one tenth the distance. With the input of Michigan's DNR, Michigan's Greenway Alliance has a 10-year plan to build 5 coast to coast bike trails. Great Lakes coast to coast trail # 1, stretching from South Haven to Port Huron is currently 75 % complete with interconnecting rural roads connecting unfinished segments. The vast majority of the trail was mostly paved asphalt, or crushed limestone. Touring tires are recommended.

The South Haven to Battle Creek section mostly curves about adjacent to the Kalamazoo River. Along the courses' pathway were the cities of Kalamazoo, Battle Creek, Jackson, Pinckney, Hell, Rochester Hills and finally Port Huron, with the final celebration underneath the Blue Water Bridge facing Sarnia, Ontario. My 5-day, 275-mile tour was sponsored by the League of Michigan Bicyclists.

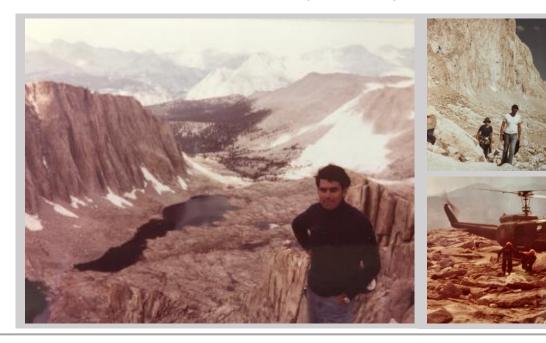

Pacific Northwest Cycling Adventure

I spent the month of August in Seattle area to ride with COGS, the bicycle club I belonged to when living there prior to 2014. I had a great time riding with friends and racked up lots of miles as well as elevation gain, enjoying magnificent views of the Pacific Northwest.

"Always fly cross country because that is where adventure and freedom lay" My story about paragliding into national records By Tony Deleo

I was introduced to hang gliding near its inception in 1974 when there were 100 pilots in the US. In the early days people would load up their gear on trucks which would take them up to the top of a mountain or hillside peak from where you would glide down to a "landing" area. The pilot who did the most circles (360's) for that flight was considered the "top" dog for that flight.

This began to change over the years and pilots via improved equipment and metrological knowledge began to notice that they were able to not only stay up but climb out. In the late 70's many pilots turned their attention to the Owens Valley at the southern end of the Inyo Mountains where the first 100 mile+ flights originated from, and ending at the North end of the White Mountains in Nevada. It was not uncommon to achieve altitudes of 16,000-18,000 feet in 2,000 feet per minute lift, most without oxygen.

The race was on for the longest flights and site records. I always stayed in the air while the conditions permitted or until dusk 8+ hours later utilizing oxygen and a catheter. On occasion I would spend the night out in the wilderness.

After 45 years and chasing records, I had (40)100+mile and (10) 200+mile flights, including (3) flights over 225+ miles. My 139-mile record paraglider flight in 1988 from Pine Mountain to Trona north of Ridgecrest still stands, as do many others.

These were tremendous adventures, some originating at Pine Mountain and ending at Primm Nevada and on another occasion 30 miles North of Bishop (on HWY 6) at White Mountain Ranch. So, when you are out riding and you see cumulus clouds know that there may be a "soaring" pilot beneath them.

CIBike Continues to Add Group Rides – More Rides = More Fun

We continue to add routes and destinations to the ride calendar.

This year, with the help of John Darling, we have launched the Easy Rider Program. At this time, we are reevaluating a future plan of action for the Easy Rider as current participation has been low. I would like to commend John for his enthusiastic and untiring work on this program.

Kate and Bill have developed *the Picnic Scenic and Picnic Hilly rides* for the July picnic. These popular rides have been added to the calendar. Sonia continues to manage the Year Rounder Program with members riding one 62-mile (100 kilometer) event each month. Also, with Carol M. as the lead, we have included four 100-mile, American Century rides into the Year Rounder. The schedule for the four, 100-mile rides was 19 February, 21 May, 13 August (CB Staff ride), with the last scheduled for 12 November. Carol is also considering the Cool Breeze Double Metric as a potential ride for 2023 as part of the Year – stay tuned.

In six months, construction will be completed on the Pacific Coast Highway. When work is finished, we will continue the Santa Monica Mountain rides.

Further, members are learning how to ride the Club routes with turn-by-turn feature voice prompts on their cell phones. This has made navigating very simple for those routes. Watch for a follow up article on this feature in the next Chain Chatter.





We are identifying ride leaders for each of the scheduled rides. Leaders help with providing directions, watch out for their group and assisting where necessary on mechanical issues. Ride leadership can be one time, part time or on an occasion. With up to three rides on Saturdays, we have been able to identify a leader for each. We are now working on Tuesday and Thursday. We always need leaders! Please contact me if you are willing to take on this role – part-time, regular or fill-in - always welcome.
